
We're proud of our safety record, our work in the community and the new partnerships we've made this year. Enjoy the newsletter and find out what we've been up to.

Our start in Strathcona

Here are a few photos from our unique start in the region more than 70 years ago. The former Whitehorse refinery was dismantled and shipped by rail, barge and ice road and reassembled right where the Strathcona refinery is located today. This type of relocation effort was a major accomplishment and earned us the nickname of the "world's most traveled refinery" as before Whitehorse, the plant was in various locations across the US.

Free Footie is a not-for-profit organization that provides vulnerable kids an opportunity to play soccer in a safe, accessible and inclusive environment – at no cost.

Supporting mental health through Edmonton Region Distress Line

Through Imperial's Employee Choice Program, Strathcona employees hand selected the Canadian Mental Health Association and the Edmonton Region Distress Line to support his year. The

Canadian Mental Health Association provides recovery-focused programs and series for people of all ages and their families. Distress line volunteer listeners answer 1,300 calls per month. Volunteers receive 64 hours of comprehensive training in crisis management, suicide prevention, family violence intervention and more.

Year round Days of Caring

Since 2017, we've been running our year-round "Days of Caring" program at Strathcona, where employees and family members, contractors and retirees support different community programs on their days off throughout the year. Organizations we worked with included the Edmonton Food Bank, Basically Babies, the Bissell Centre, Operation Friendship, Coats for Kids and Families, and Tools for Schools.

Flaring 101

As most refinery neighbours know, flaring is an important safety and environmental control tool that keeps our facility running safely. Flaring is an environmentally approved measure to safely burn excess products or materials that can't be processed during the shut-down or start-up of a unit and is a critical process to ensure the safety of people working on the equipment. We realize this can be disruptive to our neighbours and apologize for any inconvenience this may cause.
