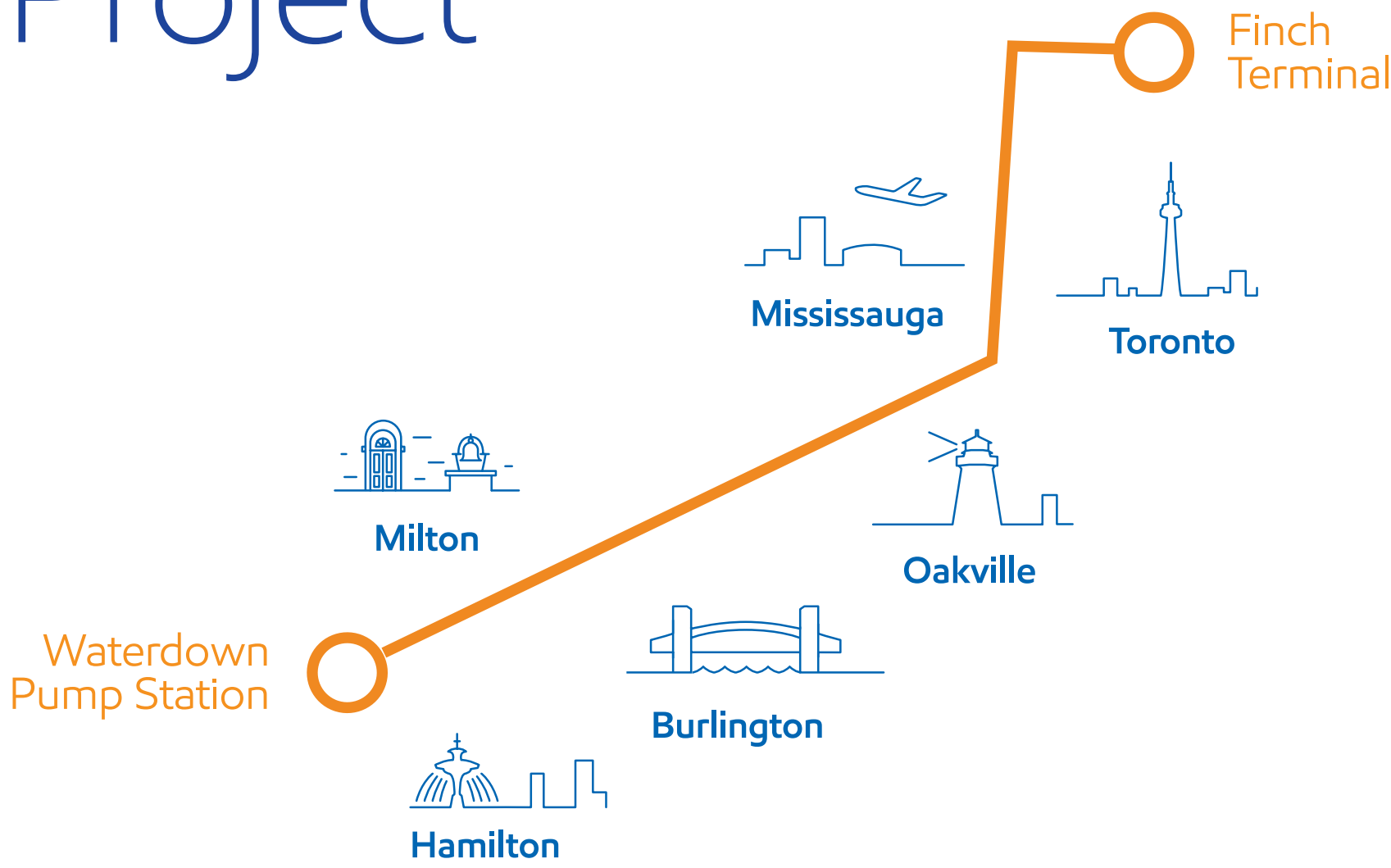


Restoration Infographic – Waterdown to Finch Project



Imperial’s Sarnia Products Pipeline has been operating safely in the Greater Toronto and Hamilton Area for many years. The Waterdown to Finch Project is a proactive measure to ensure continued safe and reliable fuels supply by replacing 63-kilometres of the pipeline, from our Waterdown pump station in rural Hamilton to our storage facility in Toronto’s North York area.

As part of our ongoing commitment to reduce local disruptions during the Project and beyond, Imperial has developed an Environmental Protection Plan as well as a Restoration Plan that will be implemented following construction. These plans will help minimize impacts and return affected areas as closely to pre-construction condition as possible.



Environmental Protection Plan

Providing environmental management and protection measures for clean-up and restoration after construction, the plan enables Imperial to:

- Prevent topsoil loss from wind and water erosion
- Establish a vegetative cover for surrounding vegetation and land uses
- Comply with regulatory, permitting and landowner commitments

Restoration Plan

Returning affected areas to pre-construction conditions can be done within one to three years post-construction by:

- Landscaping farmland and private properties in residential areas back to pre-construction conditions or providing compensation where this cannot be completed
- Maintaining land use
- Ensuring operational and maintenance requirements are met including keeping the right-of-way clear of vegetation



Restoration Process

Restoration of impacted lands requires the execution of a seven-step process.
