Strathcona refinery...70 years and counting

From the discovery of oil at Leduc No. 1 in 1947 to "oil-in" day at Strathcona on July 17, 1948, Imperial has a long, rich history in the Edmonton area. The Strathcona refinery has come a long way from the early days of a small 6,000 barrels a day operation to one of the most safe, reliable and profitable refineries in North America today.

Getting to know Regina Davis

Q: What made you decide on a career in engineering?

The refinery produces approximately 200,000 barrels/days, with 75 percent being transportation fuel...or the equivalent of about 500,000 daily fill ups. Our three grades of Synergy™ fuel have been meticulously engineered to help improve fuel economy and are available at Esso and Mobil stations across the country, as is the world's leading synthetic motor oil, Mobil 1™.





Strathcona is paving the way

Heading out on a road trip this fall? You'll probably be driving on asphalt produced at Imperial's Strathcona refinery. In fact, one in every three kilometres of Canadian highway is made with Imperial asphalt.

Imperial's asphalt production began as a small pilot project in 1975 and has now grown into a profitable part of our business, with high future potential. Imperial is the asphalt market leader in Canada with about 29 percent market share. We also export to the U.S., with approximately 10 percent market share today.

Seventy-five to 80 percent of the asphalt from Strathcona is used for road paving, while the balance is used for roofing applications. The site's customers are as close as right across the street from the refinery in Edmonton and as far away as New York and Texas.

Cogeneration update



To improve the energy efficiency at Strathcona, Imperial is building a cogeneration unit that will produce approximately 41 megawatts of electricity on a yearly basis. It will co-generate approximately 280,000 pounds of steam per hour, resulting in province-wide greenhouse gas emission reductions of up to 217,000 tonnes annually. Refineries using cogeneration are able to generate some electricity on site, reducing the power they draw from the external power grids. Preliminary construction started in December 2017, and the unit is expected to be operational in 2020.

What is that flare?

As most refinery neighbours know, flaring is an important safety and environmental control tool that keeps our facility running safely. Strathcona has had greater than normal flaring and steam venting this year due to activities associated with the planned maintenance as well as a few short-term operational issues. We realize this can be disruptive to our neighbours and apologize for any inconvenience this may have caused.
